



## Fact vs. opinion


- Only statements of purported fact can be defamatory.
- Opinion is protected.
- What counts as non-actionable opinion can be a close issue.


## Fact vs. opinion


- In considering whether a statement is a factual/actionable one, courts will consider:
  - The context
  - Whether the statement is provably false
  - Precision and specificity of language
  - Words of apparency, cautionary language
  - The medium
  - The intended audience














Fact vs. Opinion
